Please plan to stay after worship for our annual welcome brunch, to welcome back our seasonal members and to celebrate the beginning of summer (well, almost!).

Spotlight on Hymnody: The hymn tune known to many as “the Doxology” is actually called OLD 100TH, as it was originally paired with this metrical setting of Psalm 100. Today we sing it as Hymn 377. Back in the 16th century, when the Church of England ceased writing back to the Pope, hymns were considered “Romish” and of suspicious doctrinal integrity. (Ever heard of *sola scriptura*, or “scripture alone”? This was before we came up with our Anglican three-legged stool of scripture, tradition, and reason.) Anyway, back then they took to crafting these settings of the Psalms, with equal syllables for each line of a poem—very *unlike* the Hebrew poetry. This setting takes “O be joyful in the LORD all ye lands: serve the LORD with gladness, and come before his presence with a song” and renders it as “All people that on earth do dwell, sing to the Lord with cheerful voice”—not exactly the same, eh? But it sure is easier to sing it this way!

Who Knew? We Anglicans are sometimes accused of being light on doctrine, yet the Episcopal Church, as a member of the worldwide Anglican Communion, upholds the “Chicago-Lambeth Quadrilateral” of four essential elements of the church: (1) the Holy Scriptures, (2) the Nicene Creed, (3) the sacraments of Baptism and the Eucharist, and (4) the the historic episcopate.
